

Assist Socially Disadvantaged and Veteran Farmers and Ranchers Act of 2018

Background

For nearly three decades, the Outreach to Socially Disadvantaged and Veteran Farmers and Ranchers Program at the Department of Agriculture (USDA) has been the primary tool to help our nation's underserved producers gain access to USDA services.

The program is administered by the Office of Outreach and Advocacy and helps ensure that veteran, African American, Asian American, Hispanic, Native American, and immigrant socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers have opportunities to successfully own, operate, and retain farms and ranches, and to equitably participate in USDA programs.

According to USDA, the program has supported assistance to over 100,000 farmers. USDA also reports the program has been extremely active and received a record number of applications. In fiscal year 2016, the program received 296 applicants for funding requests totaling over \$29 million, with only 49 projects receiving funding.

According to 2012 Census of Agriculture data, the Program led to Hispanic and Asian-American farm operators increasing by 21 percent; Native American farm operators increasing by 5 percent; and African American farm operators increasing by 7 percent.

Bill Summary

The bill reauthorizes the Outreach to Socially Disadvantaged and Veteran Farmers and Ranchers Program, which is set to expire at the end of this Farm Bill, through 2023. It also makes several programmatic improvements to strengthen the operation of the program. This includes providing authority for multi-year grants in order to increase efficiency for both USDA and the end users, improving the grant review process through a new peer review requirement, as well as annual public reports.

The bill also requires the Secretary of Agriculture to compile and publically report data annually for each county and state in the United States on the participation by race, gender, ethnicity and veteran status in all USDA programs serving farmers or ranchers. Periodic reports by USDA are also added on topics including the allocation of base acres and payment yields, grazing permits, guaranteed loans, and crop insurance premium waivers by race, gender and ethnicity.
